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

# EDUCATION

The *Our Town* series continues to bring attention to the diverse cultures of Gig Harbor's past and present. This year-long series, developed by Education Coordinator, Elizabeth Langford, is wildly popular. Each month's presentation gains more and more interest.

The new year kicked off with a look at the English settlers at Fort Nisqually. Presenter Chris Erlich, curator at the Fort Nisqually Living History Museum, gave insight into the people and events at the fort. Also included was a living history portrayal of Letitia Work Huggins, Fort Nisqually pioneer. The celebration of England continued with a tea staining craft for kids and a lobby display on local barber, Ambrose Moore (1903-1981).

The topics of commercial fishing and ferry boats became the focal point of the local Croatian heritage in February. Children got their hands dirty with a wood block and sponge stamping craft, while speakers, Joe Uhlman and Julianne Johnson Ewings were kind enough to give two presentations about their Skansie ancestors. Artifacts belonging to George and Pauline Babich Lovrovich were on display in the lobby. In March, we featured Italy with an Italian language lessons and a presentation by Annette Spadoni Bannon about three Italian families in Gig Harbor. Michele (1876-1959) and Anita Seghieri Spadoni (1888-1941) were featured in a lobby display.

One of the great benefits of Museum membership is free and discounted admission to our programs. # ON DISPLAY Interview with Joann Hale, Exhibit Curator



Our lady of mystery! One of the inspirations for this exhibit remains nameless. Can anyone help us identify this beautifully coiffed and attired Gig Harbor woman?

A lot goes on behind the scenes when putting together an exhibit at Harbor History Museum. It's a special process that requires the skills of a sleuth and the eye of a designer. The Museum's Temporary Gallery Curator, Joann Hale, shares her process in putting together this spring's exhibit, *50 Years of Fitting In: Fashion, History & Women from 1890-1940*.

**Q: How did you get started designing exhibits at the Museum?**

**A:** My background includes fine arts (which gives me a sense of balance and color), a good knowledge of art history (which helps me understand the historic side) and I worked in a large art gallery in Cambria, California for over five years (where I learned how to hang art that would sell)!

**Q: What is the most challenging part of the process?**

**A:** The most challenging part of the process is when to know you have all of the information and resources you need. It's like Katharine (our Executive Director) says, "Watch out for rabbit holes." This translates into knowing when to stop the research and move on to the next step. This new exhibit is all the great (and sometimes unusual) firsts of women from 1890 to 1940. I had to stop at 1940 as the start of World War II opened up a new world for women.

**Q: How did you end up focusing on women and fashion for this exhibit?**

**A:** We have had a college intern, Kaitlin Johnson, working in our Collections room for some time on women's fashions. Originally we intended to just do local history but I jumped into the "rabbit hole" and discovered fascinating information about the women who made a difference. It's impossible to leave them out!

**Q: What's one of your favorite artifacts or stories that you've uncovered working on *50 Years of Fitting In*?**

**A:** Locally, one of my favorites is Ruby Chapin Blackwell. She was very beautiful. She was an Artondale school teacher in the late 1800s, a published author, and watercolorist. She was involved with the Washington State Historical Museum and her contributions of Native American baskets form the core of their collection.

Of all the photographs that belong to the Museum, my favorite is our mystery Gig Harbor lady that we are using for our poster for the show. She is so elegant...but imagine walking around in Gig Harbor's muddy dirt streets, getting into a row boat or ferry and heading to Tacoma for a day's shopping. Once you arrive on the other side of the Sound, you would walk half a mile up a dirt road to get to the first of several trolley stops to get into Tacoma, all while dressed in heeled shoes, a long skirt with petticoats, a rain cape, a feathered hat, and a corset...just to go shopping!


the opportunity to use Ancestry.com in the Museum's Resource Room.

This is an exciting time for the *Shenandoah* Restoration Project, according to lead shipwright Nate Slater. Progress is made each and every week by the over fifteen volunteers that contribute time, expertise, and labor to restoring the beloved purse seiner.

In March, Nate and his crew began their “Tree to Sea” project. Taking a green trunk of Oregon white oak, they began cutting lumber directly off the log in the parking lot of the Museum. After milling the timber, the wood was steamed and then bent into place as frames on the *Shenandoah*. As always, the details are important on this project: the green lumber is more flexible, and thus easier to bend into place. Once cured, the oak frames will be quite rigid and strong.

This attention demonstrates the crew’s ongoing commitment to the details of the boat, but it also is an important big picture moment for the restoration. Using the steamed frames from the freshly milled trunk, the crew will start to frame the portside of the *Shenandoah*. Once that it is reframed, the crew can hang deck beams and plank the working deck of the boat--a big step forward!

## COLLECTORS ITEMS

Harbor History Museum is lucky to have a bevy of volunteers and supporters with incredibly deep knowledge about Gig Harbor and its heritage, but sometimes something comes through our collection that stumps even the most well-versed Gig Harbor history enthusiast. It is then that we turn to our community and ask...

### WHAT IN THE WORLD IS THIS?!

# SNAPSHOTS OF HISTORY



This beautiful purse seiner, the *Corregidor* (82'), was owned by investors Mike and Nick Castelan, Marko Markovich, and John Jerkovich. Built in 1942, the *Corregidor* faithfully fished in Washington, Oregon, and California until it was sold in 1954 to a Canadian family. Following the sale of the *Corregidor*, Mike Castelan and his uncle, Marko Markovich, were partners in the boat, *Two Brothers* (70'), which was later renamed *Corregidor II*. After the death of his uncle, Mike sold the boat, and seined two other boats, *Sara B* and *Pillar Bay*, until he retired in 1980.
